NUMBERS SERVED

With funds from the Corning Healthcare District, Northern Valley Catholic Social Service Elder Services Program has provided service to 100 clients from October 2016 through January 2017. This number includes workshops, phone calls and consultations, referrals, or other kinds of informal help, but not outreach events.

HEALTH TALKS

Status

Monthly talks continue to be held at the Corning Senior Center on health-related topics relevant to seniors. Topics as follows:

- October -- Fire Safety Month, special guest speaker Martin Spannau, Corning Fire Chief, free prize: fire extinguisher
- November Pancreatic Cancer Awareness
- December Hypothermia
- No Health Talk in January due to holiday

Continuing on from the health and safety topics of August and September, Elaine took advantage of **October**'s Fire Safety Month to invite Corning Fire Chief, Martin Spannau, to speak to the seniors at the Corning Senior Center about home safety and fire prevention. Before introducing Mr. Spannau, Elaine began with a short discussion of fire safety in the home that included taking care when cooking, caution with rugs and extension cords, and being sure to have a fire exit strategy. The Fire Chief shared his expertise and elaborated with numerous topics, and demonstrated how to use a fire extinguisher. Elaine gave away one fire extinguisher as a prize and made the File of Life refrigerator magnets available to all, along with a variety of quality handouts. She also played Trick or Treat with the seniors and everyone received a bag of Halloween pretzels.

November was Pancreatic Awareness Month. Pancreatic Cancer continues to be one of the most common kinds of cancer in the country. It is also one of the deadliest, partly because there is no definitive test for Pancreatic Cancer. Oftentimes, the symptoms are mistaken for other ailments (gallbladder, etc.) and the cancer – which is very aggressive -- is discovered too late to respond to treatment. Elaine provided handouts describing the signs and symptoms of Pancreatic Cancer and advice on questions to ask the doctor. She also gave information about patient support resources, including the National Pancreatic Cancer Foundation, which offers a program to help low-income patients with basic cost of living expenses while they battle the disease.

With the approach of winter in **December**, the weather turned very cold and Elaine used the opportunity to talk about Hypothermia (she also managed to tie in some of October's topic on safety with space heaters). She discussed the signs that might indicate Hypothermia and ways to prevent it. In honor of the holidays, she also gave out candy canes with the information handouts.

Following on the holidays, **January** brought wet weather and time to regroup and plan for the year ahead.

FILE OF LIFE – refrigerator magnets were offered at three community events and at all monthly Health Talks.

HICAP

Open Enrollment for Medicare Part D began in mid-October. In addition to her usual appointments, Elaine performed individualized searches online during her own time to help seniors find the plans that best suited their needs before the deadline in early December. Passages noted that numbers were slightly down this year and speculated that a variety of things, notably the contentious presidential election, could have impacted the program.

DIABETES AND PARKINSON'S DISEASE SUPPORT:

Support for Diabetes and Parkinson's Disease continues to be offered.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Elaine hosted tables at the following events:

October

- Olive Festival in Corning offered information about Medicare / HICAP along with other health-related materials
- Latino Outreach Multicultural Health Fair county-wide event at the Veterans Halls in Corning. Offered a variety of health-related informational materials as well as the File of Life. Gave away a walker and incontinence supplies.

November

- Senior Fair at the Corning Senior Center -- gave away incontinence supplies, File of Life, and provided an Emergency Preparedness starter pack as a door prize.
- LIFT Tehama at the Tehama County Fairgrounds Elaine hosted a table where she

 county-wide event that incorporates three erstwhile independent events: Recycle the
 Warmth, Project Homeless Connect, and Continuum of Care.

Also in October, Elaine made home visits. Well-being checks were made in Los Molinos to a client who has diabetes and to an elderly woman in Corning who suffered a fall. Elaine gave her a walker.

October was a busy month, as Elaine offered cooking and nutrition classes at Tehama Village in Corning and at Sherwood Manor in Los Molinos. Nothing says October quite like pumpkins, so Elaine demonstrated how to make a simple but tasty pumpkin stew. She gave away a lovely ceramic canister set as a prize.

The holidays were made less festive by the sudden passing of one of Elaine's longest and dearest clients from the Corning Senior Center, who left this world three days after Christmas. Vicki will be greatly missed.

In January, Elaine received a request from a Social Worker at Tehama County Department of Social Services on behalf of an elderly Corning woman who needed a bath chair. A very nice bath/transfer chair had been donated to Elder Services last August and Elaine was happy to find it a new home.

Also in January came the news of yet another loss in Tehama Village, a delightful man with a ready smile who often attended Elaine's workshops. RIP Cory.

He has a little companion dog.)
- Thank you for the gifts. It was everything I wish for. Thank the Lord that there are wonderful people that give from the heart. Merry Christmas!
- Thank you so much for the gifts. My dog and I truly appreciate everything. I hope you had a wonderful holiday! (From an older diabetic woman with a multitude of other health problems.)
- Your gifts are all wonderful and very useful if not necessary. I and my family want to tell you how much we appreciate your Christmas gifts and services we get throughout the year. Because I live alone now, I feel your organization, especially Karen and Elaine, are family.

Information and Referral

Elaine frequently receives inquiries regarding health issues and resources. She provides information and practical assistance whenever possible, as well as referrals (not endorsements) to appropriate health service providers when necessary. Elaine has responded to requests for help by providing information and educational material on a variety of health-related topics. During the months included in this report, Elaine took phone calls and requests from seniors needing help or information on a wide variety of topics, including Medicare and Medi-Cal, mental health, emergency housing and food, transportation, durable medical equipment, diabetes, and Care Credit to help pay for dental work.

RAISING PUBLIC AWARENESS AND UNDERSTANDING

Launched Public Outreach Campaign - Called "Districts Make the Difference," this campaign built a robust website platform providing members, media, and the public with a toolkit that includes fact sheets, talking points, and other information, including a dozen professionally produced videos about special districts.

Promoted Social Media Engagement — Actively managed Facebook, Twitter, and YouTube accounts pushing original content and driving activity towards DistrictsMakeTheDifference.org.

Conducted Statewide Video Contest - Received 20 videos from high school and college students educating the public about how special districts make a difference in their communities, and awarded scholarships to the top three after more than a thousand votes were cast in the online competition.

LEADING WHEN IT MATTERS MOST: LITTLE HOOVER COMMISSION REVIEW

Represented all Special Districts - Issued a 19-page written testimony and delivered the lead oral testimony at the Commission's August hearing on special districts in follow-up to its 2000 report, Special Districts: Relics of the Past or Resources for the Future.

Organized an Effective Response - Managed conference calls and meetings with special district officials and stakeholders, and spoke frequently with Commission staff to foster a mutual understanding of concerns and opportunities.



PROTECTING CRITICAL LOCAL FUNDS

Guarded Public Works Contracts - Led a coalition in the successful opposition of legislation that would have made it illegal to require contracted architects and engineers to defend legal claims related to their work on behalf of special districts and other public agencies (SB 885).

Saved Money for Small Districts - Successfully sponsored legislation that established a new, more affordable, alternative to annual financial audits for special districts with less than \$250 thousand in annual revenue (AB 2613).

Blocked Employee Orientation Mandate - As part of a coalition, successfully opposed legislation that would have required special districts to provide employees various orientations in an overly prescriptive fashion, including union membership orientations on paidtime (AB 2835).

REPRESENTING SPECIAL DISTRICTS IN THE COURTS OF LAW

Defended State Mandate Reimbursements - Fought against the State Mandates Commission's actions to deny mandate reimbursements to special districts with fee authority (amicus brief: Paradise Irrigation District v. Commission on State Mandates).

Supported Local Boards' Fee Authority – Argued against efforts to circumvent the established Proposition 218 and local initiative processes and special district board decisions related to necessary fees (amicus brief: Monterey Peninsula Taxpayers' Association v. Board of Directors of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District).

Established Reasonable Brown Act Interpretation - Successfully petitioned the State Attorney General to opine that the Brown Act is not necessarily violated when a local agency's website experiences technical difficulties that cause an agenda to become inaccessible.
